Car Washing is a dirty business!

When you're washing your car in the driveway, remember you're not just washing your car in the driveway! Everything that was making your car dirty is now making our streams dirty!

The Pollution - Wash Water

- Wash water that flow into the street and storm drains goes directly to the stream
- The average driveway carwash uses 116 gallons of water!
- Most soaps contain phosphates and other chemicals that can be harmful to fish and wildlife



- Take your car to a car wash. Car wash stations recycle the wash water and send the dirty water to the waste water treatment plant
- Wash your car in the grass so that the water can soak into the ground and help your grass grow
- Use less water. Use a bucket and rag instead of a pressure washer and put a spray nozzle on the hose so that it shuts off when not needed

Use soap sparingly and pour out all wash buckets onto grass, not the curb, street or storm drain For more information contact the Stormwater Coordinator at (770)963-4002 X 207.

At 5:00 pm we will be celebrating the ribbon cutting and grand opening for our Whistlestop Shops. Auburn loves celebrating our community with safe, family-friendly events.

Family is very important to us at the City of Auburn. We celebrate our family successes together and our sorrows. Many times, though, there is sorrow within a family that is unseen by casual observers. Recent events in Auburn have brought to mind that not everyone has a happy story at home and our thoughts and prayers go to out to the families involved. Domestic violence continues to be an issue in our society. The statistics are staggering:

- 20 people per minute are physical abused by an intimate partner, that means more than 10 million men and women are physically abused in a year in the U.S.
- On a typical day, domestic violence hotlines nationwide receive 20,800 calls
- Presence of a gun in a domestic violence situation increases the risk of homicide by 500%
- Domestic violence is not just against women and children. Men are also victims however, because of the stigma attached, it is very underreported.

I have had the honor of serving on the board for Peace Place and Auburn Police Chief Carl Moulder began stepped up in 2016 when I stepped down. Peace Place is a domestic violence program that covers Banks, Barrow and Jackson County. They offer emergency shelter, transitional housing, rapid rehousing, outreach and legal advocacy, safety planning, educational presentations, and children's services. They also operate a thrift store to help fund the operations of the agency. In 2015-2016 Peace Place received 2,351 hotline calls, 99 clients were served through their outreach program, 91 adults and 58 children were served in the shelter, and they helped file 99 protective orders this past year.

The City of Auburn Police Department is committed to the safety of all citizens and has a strong partnership with Peace Place. Trained to recognize the signs of domestic violence, officers assess situations and offer information and referrals to those they suspect of being victims (including a booklet that the department produced internally on how to make an escape plan.) Auburn Police officers are there not only to enforce the laws but to protect those in need. Speak up. You are not alone.

Domestic Violence is something that should never be ignored. It should be recognized and addressed. Know the signs. Offer help if you can. There is no excuse and this can't be considered "family business." Don't let someone become a statistic. Emergency Notification System

Auburn citizens can sign up to receive alerts by text, phone calls and/or email through the Everbridge system. **This** system will operate together with Auburn's outdoor emergency siren systems. These alerts will come from local public safety and municipalities to help keep our citizens informed of emergencies as well as road closures, and water/power outages. Notice: Water Consumption Rate Increase

The water consumption rate increase that was passed on June 6, 2013 by Mayor and Council for the New Increases with Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) effective on March 1st of each year will go into effect on Water Bills Due by April 15, 2017 with an increase of 2.1% to an index level of 241.432 (1982-84=100).

The 2.1 % increase will be a \$.11 to .16 per 1000 gallons increase for City residents. A City customer using 5,000 gallons a month would be billed from \$43.02 to \$43.61.
