# **Pest Control - Mosquito Control Tips**

As everyone knows, mosquitoes are very annoying pests. They attack humans and animals alike, and can spoil an outdoor

gathering rather guickly. Fortunately, there are ways to control mosquitoes. The American Mosquito Control Association www.mosquito.org reports that there are over 2,500 different species of mosquitoes around the world. The best way to control mosquitoes is to eliminate their breeding sites.

### Here are some breeding control tips:

- Do not allow water to accumulate anywhere in your yard for more than two days. Cans, buckets, pots, plastic swimming pools and tires are all containers that tend to collect and hold water. Removing these items will help control the number of mosquitoes that hatch in your yard.
- Keep the gutters clean. If leaves or other debris clog your gutters and prevent them from draining, water will accumulate in the gutter system, providing the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- Do not over-water your lawn or garden. This may cause water to be left standing for more than one day.
- If your cistern, septic tank or cesspool seeps, fixing the problem will help control the number of mosquitoes that plaque your yard.
- Filling swampy areas, ditches and drain puddles will eliminate mosquito breeding grounds. If filling is not possible, these areas may be treated with commercial mosquito control products.
- If you have a backyard pond, stock it with mosquito fish (minnows). These fish eat mosquitoes and their larvae.
- Change the water in your wading pool or birdbaths at least once per week. Stagnant water makes the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes.



#### **Chief's Corner**



In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation which designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which that date falls as Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others.

In years past, tens of thousands of law enforcement officers from around the world converge on Wash-

ington, DC to participate in a number of events which honor those that have paid the ultimate sacrifice. These Memorial Services began in 1982 as a gathering in Senate Park of approximately 120 survivors and supporters of law enforcement. Decades later, the event, more commonly known as National Police Week, has grown to a seies of events which attracts thousands of survivors, supporters and law enforcement officers to our Nation's Capital each year. Each year in the City of Auburn the Mayor and Council sign a proclamation designating the week of May 15, as Police Week in the City of Auburn. This year the dates of Police Week will be May 14<sup>th</sup> to May 20<sup>th</sup>. Law Enforcement across the United States has come under great scrutiny and in some rare incidences under attack. The members of the City of Auburn Police Department play an essential role in safeguarding the rights and freedoms of the Citizens of Auburn. The Auburn Police Department is a professional law enforcement agency and works unceasingly to protect our citizens against violence or disorder.

It is important that all citizens know and understand the problems, duties and responsibilities of their police department, and that members of our police department recognize their duty to serve everyone within the community without bias. Our officers do a great job of communicating with our citizens but we felt we were missing an opportunity to do more. That's how the Auburn Citizen's Police Academy came to be. This free course, facilitated by Sgt. Marc Pharr, offers participants training and presentations and gives them hands-on experiences similar to those that your police officers experience daily. The next class will be offered beginning in early August. Because the program is such a success and the participants invited to remain involved, the Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association was formed. These individuals assist the Police Department in many ways throughout the year, you'll always see them at our awesome festivals. We also have a BSA – Explorers program for our younger citizens. This program is for young adults, ages 14 to 20, who have an interest in law enforcement. Like the Citizen's Police Academy, they receive hands-on experience and assist the city in many ways.

Please take a moment to observe the week of May 14th through 20th, 2017, as Police Week to commemorate police officers, past and present, who by their faithful and loyal devotion to their communities, have earned our gratitude. I also highly recommend the Citizen's Police Academy and Explorers program to those interested in learning more about your police department and the role they play in the community. We are here for you – day or night. I am proud of the fine men and women who serve this community.
