Important Water Notice

The City of Auburn operates a distribution water system in which it purchases water treated by Barrow County. The City received a notice from the Department of Natural Resources indicating that certain microbial levels and concentrations of byproducts were detected in the water. It appears this condition was caused by lower water usage which caused water treated by Barrow County to be stored in the water lines longer that it typically is. This allows the microbes to grow. The City has taken corrective action by flushing its lines. The City's water operator indicates these steps in sequence will remedy this issue. Although this is not an emergency, you have the right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct the situation. Stormwater affects everything we do!

When you're washing your car in the driveway, remember you're not just washing your car in the driveway! Everything that was making your car dirty is now making our streams dirty!


The Pollution - Wash Water

- Wash water that flows into the street and storm drains goes directly to the stream
- The average driveway carwash uses 116 gallons of water! Most soaps contain phosphates and other chemicals that can be harmful to fish and wildlife

The Solution – How You Can Help!

- Take your car to a car wash. Car wash stations recycle the wash water and send the dirty water to the waste water treatment plant
- Wash your car in the grass so that the water can soak into the ground and help your grass grow
- Use less water. Use a bucket and rag instead of a pressure washer and put a spray nozzle on the hose so that it shuts off when not needed
- Use soap sparingly and pour out all wash buckets onto grass, not the curb, street or storm drain

Celebrate Freedom

Juneteenth—June 19, 2021

What is Juneteenth you might ask? This is the holiday commemorating the Emancipation of enslaved people in the U.S. As the Civil War came to a close in 1865, a number of people remained enslaved, especially in remote areas. Word of slavery's end traveled slowly, and for those who were largely isolated from Union armies, life continued as if freedom did not exist.

This was especially the case in Texas, where thousands of slaves were not made aware of freedom until June 19, 1865, when Union Gen. Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston and issued an order officially freeing them. Their celebration would serve as the basis of June 19 — or Juneteenth — a holiday celebrating emancipation in the US. Juneteenth has become the most prominent Emancipation Day holiday in the US, It doesn't mark the signing of the 1863 Emancipation Proclamation which enshrined the end of slavery into the Constitution. Instead, it marks the moment when emancipation finally reached those in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy.



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Dog Paw Care: Tips For Summer Safety
 Have you ever walked outside barefoot and immediately wished you had shoes? Painful, right? When the weather starts warming up, the pavement temp rises too. It can quickly become too hot for our feet to handle. What about our dogs? A huge misconception that many people have is: A dog's paws can tolerate anything. That's not true. Just like human feet, paws can crack, blister, and bleed. Hot pavement can cause burns and permanent damage.

So, how hot is the asphalt? According to the Journal Of The American Medical Association, when the air temperature is a comfortable 77°F, asphalt in the sun is actually a whopping 125°F! Taking it up a notch, when the air is 87°F, the asphalt could be 143°F. That's way too hot for our pup's paws. Experts say when the asphalt reaches 125°F, skin destruction can happen to dogs in as little as 60 seconds! If you can't walk on it barefoot, your pet's feet will be suffering too.

So when considering taking your pups with you on a hot summer day, remember to protect those paws! If there will be a lot of asphalt, consider paw boots, paw butter or possibly taking your walk when it cools off.
