It's a beautiful time of year. May is the perfect time to enjoy the springtime with your families. May is also National Foster Child Month. Foster children and the foster care system are very near and dear to my heart. I'd like to give you a little insight into a foster child's thoughts.

Children in foster care know they are only with you for a while. They wonder what happened to their mom/parents. Even if it was a bad situation, they still long for their family. Foster children, like all children, want to know they matter, that they are wanted and valuable. Fosters typically want to be accepted, they want to fit in and they want to know the rules. They typically will not ask questions so foster parents must help make them feel that they are safe to speak with.

Children are our most valuable asset in a society after all they will one day be the adults in our community. I am a living example of this! Let me *share my story:

As a child I lived in both an orphanage and a foster home. In my case, I had two sisters whom I was separated from when we went into the foster care system. When I lived in the foster home I had several other children that came and went in the home. The foster parents had a daughter who was theirs and a little older then me and a son who was a baby when I lived there. The foster home was my home in a strong sense. We went on little trips, they let me take ballet lessons. I remember the foster father teaching me how to garden. I played in the yard, I had dolls and I had clothes that my foster mother made for me. I had a bedroom that I shared with my foster sister and when I went to bed I knew I would wake up in a safe place. I remember a very special woman, a social worker, would come and visit me. She picked me up from school once every couple of months and would take me for ice cream or hot chocolate. I remember her so well, when she showed up I was very excited! I loved our outings. She made me feel hopeful! Now as an adult, let me tell you what I never thought about as a child. My foster parents were a machinist and a bus driver. They didn't take care of children because they made a lot of money. They just loved children and had a heart to help. They weren't perfect but who is a perfect parent? I grew to love them. I loved gardening and loved the smell of machine oil, I loved making clothes. I loved taking care of the other children that came into our home. Unfortunately, I was taken from that home never to return. I wasn't safe after I left there. I longed for "my home" as I had come to know it. I went through very difficult years, however, the time I spent with my foster family kept me hopeful in so many ways. I had love modeled for me, a family shown to me that enabled me so many years later to know how to be a mother and how to keep a household. In the last few years I reconnected with this special family. The foster mother cried in joy telling me so many stories of when I was a child. She sent me photographs which I treasure as I had no pictures of myself as a child. My foster sister calls me her Linda as she used to when we were

children. I hope to fly to California to visit this special lady. She's in her eighties and such a delight!

Becoming a foster parent is not a spur of the moment decision. There are over 400,000 children in foster care. There is in depth training involved. Background checks. This is all for the safety of the child. However, there are many reasons that make that all worthwhile! Just of few of these reasons are: Children Need Your Love.

- Change Future Generations Break the Cycle of Abuse.
- Consider It a Mission Field.
- Teach your children how to give of themselves
- Keep Siblings together

So, if you're considering becoming a foster parent, don't let fear hold you back. You don't need to be rich, you don't need to be perfect. Just love and care for a child even if it's only for a couple of years. You will change a life! Pest Control - Mosquito Control Tips

As everyone knows, mosquitoes are very annoying pests. They attack humans and animals alike, and can spoil an outdoor gathering rather quickly. Fortunately, there are ways to control mosquitoes. The American Mosquito Control Association www.mosquito.org reports that there are over 2,500 different species of mosquitoes around the world. The best way to control mosquitoes is to eliminate their breeding sites.

Here are some breeding control tips:

- Do not allow water to accumulate anywhere in your yard for more than two days. Cans, buckets, pots, plastic swimming pools and tires are all containers that tend to collect and hold water. Removing these items will help control the number of mosquitoes that hatch in your yard.
- Keep the gutters clean. If leaves or other debris clog your gutters and prevent them from draining, water will accumulate in the gutter system, providing the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. Do not over-water your lawn or garden. This may cause water to be left standing for more than one day.

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If your cistern, septic tank or cesspool seeps, fixing the problem will help control the number of mosquitoes that plague your

Filling swampy areas, ditches and drain puddles will eliminate mosquito breeding grounds. If filling is not possible, these areas

may be treated with commercial mosquito control products. If you have a backyard pond, stock it with mosquito fish (minnows). These fish eat mosquitoes and their larvae. Change the water in your wading pool or birdbaths at least once per week. Stagnant water makes the perfect breeding
