BACKGROUND: National Public Works Week has been celebrated during the third week in May since 1960. In 1962 President John F. Kennedy signed the Presidential Proclamation.



PURPOSE: Local Road Assistance Administration Funding Grant (LRA)

BACKGROUND: The Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) has announced the Governor, and the Legislature has included \$250 million in Local Road Assistance Administration funds (LRA) in the amended fiscal year 2024 budget. The LRA funds will be administered and distributed using grants (LMIG) application system. Eligible activities and projects for LRA funds will be the same as the LMIG program. LRA funds will **NOT** require a match.

The City's LRA funding for 2024 is \$127,268.77 of which the City **does NOT** need to match funds. Deadline for submittal is June 15, 2024.

My recommendation for the City's LRA funding submittal is College Street. College Street is structurally failing on the surface of the roadway. The dirt and soil beneath the asphalt shifts as vehicles pass over the road. Over time, the asphalt has cracked and has become loose. Heavy vehicles such as tractor-trailers, construction vehicles, garbage trucks and buses routinely travel on this road causing potholes and uneven road surfaces, and the sewer is located under a portion of this road.

FUNDING: State LRA Grant \$127,268.77

RECOMMENDATION: Approve College Street as the selected road for the GDOT 2024 Local Road Assistance Administration Funding in the amount of \$127,268.77 to be used for asphalt resurfacing improvements

The LRA funds will be administered and distributed using our GRANTS (LMIG) Application System. Eligible activities/projects for LRA funds will be the same as the LMIG program. LRA funds will require NO match. To see your formula amount, please visit the Department's website at <https://www.dot.ga.gov/GDOT/Pages/LMIG.aspx>.

The Department will begin accepting applications for LRA funds on March 15, 2024. All electronic applications must be received no later than June 15, 2024. To begin your application, please visit the Department's website at <https://www.dot.ga.gov/GDOT/Pages/LMIG.aspx>. The site provides a link to the LMIG Application, the LMIG Application Tutorial (Manual), and the General Guidelines. Your project list will be entered directly into the LMIG Application System. Please contact your District State Aid Coordinator for assistance with the online application process. The coordinators' contact information is below.

For an application to be processed, the following requirements must be met:

- A local government must be in audit compliance with the Department of Audits and Accounts (DOAA). A local government must also be in compliance with the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) minimum standards under the Georgia Planning Act, related to immigration and the Service Delivery Strategy law. (A non-compliant local government may start a draft application and then submit it once the local government is compliant.)
- A signed cover letter must be attached that includes a completion status of the last three fiscal years' LMIG Grants.
- A signature page must include both the local government seal and the notary seal. The application website provides a blank signature page for you to download, complete and upload as an attachment.

The Department wants to ensure these funds are deployed to address your infrastructure needs quickly. The Department will start the Fiscal Year 2025 LMIG Program in July, so please submit your LRA applications as soon as possible.

They serve as a deterrent to criminal activity and can aid law enforcement in quickly responding to incidents such as auto accidents, wanted persons, or other emergencies occurring in the monitored areas.


1. Site plan for camera installation
