We're talking about toxic chemicals, such as drain and oven cleaners, paint, and paint thinner, to name only a few. When these are poured down household drains, storm drains, toilets, or on the ground, those chemicals end up in nearby waters.

An easy way to reduce the number of chemicals that you have to dispose of, is to try to use non-hazardous products when you can. Lemon juice, vinegar, hot water, borax, soap, and baking soda are good alternatives, and there are many recipes online. Our favorite is this all-purpose cleaner that you can prepare and use by adding to a spray bottle: ½ cup vinegar and ¼ cup baking soda mixed into ½ gallon of water. 

Auburn Police Connection

As we move into the new year, the Auburn Police Department vould like to remind everyone to be safe when you are out and about. This does not just mean to be safe in your car while traveling, this means you should be aware of safety concerns as a pedestrian as well. Did you know that as of December 2015, Gwinnett County has experienced an ncrease in serious injury/fatality vehicle accidents with 53 fatality accidents. Pedestrian accidents have also increased - over 200 citizens have been struck by vehicles in Gwinnett County. Several of these have accidents have resulted in serious injuries or fatalities. Distracted driving. particularly texting, has been contributed to many of the collisions. Statistics in Barrow County reflect the same trend.

Texting and driving isn't the only factor here: The number of pedestrian deaths and injuries has risen dramatically as a result of texting while walking. The obvious dangers of texting while driving have been the focus of nationwide public service announcements, but now the dangers of distracted walking are coming to the forefront. The number of pedestrians who died rose from 4.109 in 2009 to 4.432 in 2011 and an additional 69,000 injuries, according to a study published by the National Highway Fraffic Safety Administration.

Scary trends: While it is hard to prove an exact number of how many injuries were caused by telephone distractions, an Ohio State University study that shows the dramatic increase in emergency room visits cause by distracted walking. 'If current trends continue, I wouldn't be surprised if the number of injuries to pedestrians caused by cell phones doubles again between 2010 and 2015, Ohio State University researcher Jack Nasar said after the school's study about distracted walking. A new public safety campaign is now in the works and KTLA reports that the federal government is hoping to have pedestrians put down the phone for their own safety.

'We've done a good job alerting people to the dangers of being a distracted driver, but we haven't done a good job of alerting people to the dangers of being a distracted pedestrian,' said Jonathan Adkins, a spokesman for the Governors Highway Safety Association.

Please keep your safety and the safety of those around you first and foremost in your mind. Don't become a statistic in 2016. Just as you know not to text and drive,

remember walking and texting can be just as dangerous. Use the crosswalks when available, be aware of your surroundings, and don't walk while distracted. It can wait.

Bicycle Trailhead Construction to Begin Soon!

As 2016 begins, you will see construction commencing at the Bicycle Trailhead on Mt. Moriah Road. Auburn has long been a destination for cyclists to come for scenic rides. The construction of the trailhead will bring even more two wheeled visitors to our area.

The City of Auburn is excited to provide this much needed trailhead to our

visitors. The fountain, tables, shade and bicycle drop off/pick up lanes will make this a much used park in the City.

Millions of people bicycle safely on public roads. But many are scared away because motorists sometimes pass too closely, honk or tell cyclists to get off the road. Though these behaviors are not the most common source of injuries to cyclists, they are unsafe and illegal. The traffic law says that drivers must pass at a safe distance. When a travel lane is not wide enough to share, safe bicyclists move to the middle of the lane to insure that motorists use the next lane over to pass or wait until it is safe. Cyclists who ride too close to the edge of the road are risk colliding with suddenly-opening doors of parked cars or falling due to hazards such as sand, poor pavement, or debris. Motorists can help prevent crashes with cyclists by taking care to follow the rules on yielding and turning. Make sure to yield to cyclists when turning left or entering the road from a side street, driveway, or parking lane. Merge completely to the far right edge of the road in advance of making a right turn. Wait for any bicyclist ahead to clear the intersection before you make a right turn — do not turn across the path of the cyclist. Even if there is a bike lane, you should merge into the bike lane before turning right.

Cyclists, in turn, can make themselves safer and respected. Competent cyclists politely cooperate with other drivers by yielding when required, choosing the correct lane at intersections, using lights at night, and otherwise following the same traffic laws as motorists. Such cyclists are far safer than inexperienced cyclists.

Cycling safety is a team effort. Are you doing your part?
